Who Was Saint Patrick?

Born around 385 AD.

Born in Bannavem Taburniae.

When he was 16, raiders from Ireland captured him and took him back to Ireland as a slave.

He was kept there for six years, until he was finally able to escape.

Saint Patrick travelled to Europe before eventually making it back to his family in Cornwall.

Once back home, he decided to study as a priest. After becoming a Bishop, he made a strange decision....

....he would travel back to Ireland to spread the word of God to the people there.




Why Do We Celebrate Saint Patrick?
